VotesforSchools Lesson Plan: KS2



Are conspiracy theories more dangerous than we realise?

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5 mins	1. Starter: Seeing is believing	Whole class	Pupils discuss a selection of conspiracy theories and decide whether they are true or false by moving around the room.
4-5 mins	2. What is a conspiracy theory?	Whole class	Pupils learn about the term "conspiracy theory" to empower them to discuss them for the rest of the lesson.
3-4 mins	3. Why are we talking about this?	Whole class	Pupils explore why this topic is important at the moment.
8-15 mins	4. Theories in action	Individual/ Whole class	Pupils place various conspiracy theories onto a grid based on how believable the idea is and whether it is dangerous.
5-10 mins	5. What would you do?	Whole class/ Pair	Pupils consider some scenarios where they may encounter a conspiracy theory. They then choose the best response to the scenario from a selection of options.
Optional	Call to Action!	Whole class	Pupils have the opportunity take this topic beyond the classroom. See below for details.
N/A	Get involved!	Whole class	Pupils vote on the question using the Yes/No arguments to help. If you would like to find out more about VotesforSchools, get in touch!
5+ mins	Extension: Create a conspiracy theory!	Whole class	Pupils use a grid of options and dice to create a theory!
